




Plant is an erect, succulent perennial, with long, bare rootstock, whole plant reddish to purplish below the inflorescence. Stems 15-25 cm tall, upper part glandular, with many bracts. Leaves mostly dense, basal rosettes, spatulate, 2-3 cm long. Inflorescence greenish-yellow, 12-14 cm long and glandular-puberulent, calyx lobes ovate, stamens slightly longer than calyx. Seeds many, striate, cross-barred and brown.
